1. Organisations offering support to disabled people

Organisations

There are a number of organisations which offer support for disabled people. These can include Disabled People's Organisations, or DPOs, which are organisations that are led and controlled by disabled individuals. DPOs play a role in advocating for the rights and needs of the disabled community, and some also provide support, advice and services to disabled people. There are also many local and national organisations which seek to provide research, campaign on behalf of disabled people or provide direct support. Details of organisations are set out below.

Work Fit (Downs Syndrome Association)

WorkFit is a programme designed to improve access to mainstream employment and other meaningful activities for people with Down's syndrome. The scheme matches jobseekers who have Down's syndrome with employers who have jobs to offer. A dedicated WorkFit Officer supports jobseekers and employers at all stages of the process. WorkFit engage with employers and matches them to the hopes and ambitions of jobseekers, supporting them to be more independent, learn new skills, meet new people, earn money and increase their self-esteem. Support to Work (Scope)

Support to work is a free 12 week online and telephone support programme for disabled people who are looking for paid work in England and Wales.

This service starts by speaking to a specialist employment advisor, by phone or online. They will listen to any challenges or barriers you have experienced and will give specific advice for your situation. They can provide support with many aspects of looking for paid work, including;

- developing confidence and job skills like time management;
- how and where to look for jobs;
- identifying your strengths and transferable skills;
- reviewing your CV to meet your employment goals; and
- mock interviews.

Redundancy Action Scheme (ReAct+)

The ReAct+ programme is funded by the Welsh Government. The programme helps people who have been affected by redundancy in the last 6 months and is disabled to get back into work. Employers using the programme receive £4,000 paid in four instalments over 12 months to help cover the qualifying person's wages.

UnLtd

UnLtd finds, funds and supports social entrepreneurs. New ventures may be eligible for awards of up to £8,000. Social ventures looking to grow may be able to apply for up to £18,000. Grant winners will also have access to the advice, guidance and expertise needed to build on the foundations of the social venture. At least 50% of awards go to support social entrepreneurs who are disabled and/or from Black, Asian or minority ethnic backgrounds.
